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Housing Options Manager



Who are the Housing Options team?

- 10 Options officers, led by 2 team leaders
 - 7 officers focussing on families and vulnerable people
 - 2 officers focussing on single homeless people
 - 1 officer focussing on single homeless people and ex-offenders
 - Housing Options Admin Officer
- Temporary Accommodation (TA) team, led by TA Manager
 - 2 Temporary accommodation Officers
 - 2 Temporary Accommodation Support officers



Responsibilities

- Primary Focus Prevention of Homelessness
 - Negotiating with excluders (relatives, landlords, letting agents) in order to maintain accommodation
 - Securing alternative accommodation (social housing, private sector housing, supported accommodation)
- When Prevention is not possible
 - Advice to assist people find accommodation
 - Referrals to other partners
 - In some cases, Council provides accommodation



When do we accommodate?

- Not everyone is placed into temporary accommodation
- Only those that meet legal criteria are entitled to accommodation
 - Families with dependent children
 - Those that meet specific definition of vulnerability
 - Victims of domestic violence
 - Several other categories




Last resort

 All efforts are made to avoid the need for our Temporary Accommodation

- High demand; Limited availability
- Redevelopment plan in place for new Temporary
 Accommodation, increasing the number of units available

Options available


The Housing Options team provide advice about solutions to applicants, including:

- Assistance in obtaining accommodation in the private sector
- Financial assistance to retain existing accommodation (payment of arrears, shortfalls in rent, etc)
- Financial assistance to secure alternative accommodation (deposit payments, rent in advance, other expenses)
- Referrals to partners, assisting with support needs
- Close working with the Housing Allocations team, using the Allocations policy as a prevention tool where appropriate

Working in Partnership

 Partnerships to expand our toolkit in assisting applicants to prevent homelessness or find accommodation

















<u>beam</u>

- Social Enterprise organisation
- Based on crowdfunding model, to assist people into employment and housing
- Work with employers and landlords
- WHBC Pilot scheme; 40 households over 12 months
- Welwyn Hatfield launched in March 2023; highest number of launch referrals
- Over 130 households referred
- 2 successful outcomes so far





- Provide financial/budgeting/benefits advice
- Supports the Council's Homelessness Prevention work
- Increase in affordability for rising cost of living and rents
- Expertise in maximising benefit income
- Assist with debt reduction and negotiation







- Pilot scheme to target mental health and substance/alcohol dependency
- Dual diagnosis has been obstacle in the past
- Joint working allows better focus on positive outcomes
- Leads to increased suitability for accommodation and better chances of sustaining accommodation





- Provider of accommodation across several schemes
- Peartree hostel in WGC
- Supported accommodation and Move On Schemes around the district
- Redevelopment of Peartree site soon to commence
- Currently discussing potential expansion of supported housing for rough sleepers





- Provider of supported accommodation
- Housing First model, providing accommodation for entrenched and repeat rough sleepers
- Two properties in Hatfield, Nine bedspaces in shared accommodation
- Assists people to develop skills to manage their own tenancy
- Once ready for move on, assisted into accommodation





- Operates ReStart Project
- Outreach, Accommodation and Move on Support
- Responds to reports of rough sleepers from members of public
- Offers assistance away from the streets
- Provides accommodation whilst causes of homelessness are addressed
- Assistance with move on into accommodation



Welwyn Hatfield Temporary Accommodation

Welwyn Hatfield Borough Council has 4 main sites of Temporary Accommodation in the district, and several other properties that it uses for housing homeless applicants.

Welwyn Garden City:

- Inspira House
- Howlands House

Hatfield

- Burfield Close
- Hazel Grove House



Welwyn Garden City

Inspira House, Martinfield

- Former office block converted into residential accommodation.
- 54 units in total, across two levels.
- 18 one bed flats
- 36 studio flats.

Howlands House, Howlands

- 20 units of 3 bed accommodation.
- Prior to COVID pandemic was shared accommodation, with households sharing with other households.
- Since the pandemic the accommodation is single occupancy and is used for larger families.
- Planning application to redevelop the site is pending, awaiting approval.



Hatfield

Burfield Close

- Former sheltered accommodation site, repurposed for TA
- Due for redevelopment after Howlands House is completed and in use.
- Currently 25 units across two levels and two buildings.
- 24 one bed flats
- 1 two bed flat.

Hazel Grove House, Bishops Rise

- 20 units in total
- 9 one bed flats
- 10 studio flats
- 1 two bed flat




Other accommodation

Current Occupancy





Averages across different groups are not very helpful, as there are varying reasons for longer and shorter stays.


The length of time in TA for those who meet the full housing criteria is provided below, against the values for those who do not meet the criteria.

Main duty not owed	28 days	35 days	30 days




Causes of Homelessness
