RECOMMENDATION OF GRANTS BOARD – ANNUAL GRANTS

1 <u>Executive Summary</u>

1.1 The Grants Board met on 20th February 2025 to consider applications to the 2025/26 annual grants scheme. This report sets out the recommendations from the Grants Board relating to the allocation of funding.

2 <u>Recommendation(s)</u>

2.1 That Cabinet agrees the recommendations from Grants Board in relation to the applications for annual grants for 2025/26 as set out in table 3.5.

3 Explanation

- 3.1 Welwyn Hatfield Borough Council sought applications to its Annual Grants application process for the 2025/26 financial year. Individual organisations were invited to apply for up to £15,000 of funding to support their activities, with an approved budget total of £73,000 available.
- 3.2 In June 2024, the Grants Board considered and agreed the evaluation criteria for the annual grants process and also the introduction of a minimum required level of funding into application. This was introduced to ensure that the Board could adequately assess a reasonable level of funding if the scheme was again over-subscribed. (Appendix A)
- 3.3 On 20th February 2025, the Grants Board met to consider the thirty-four applications. As part of the application process all applicants were asked to detail the minimum contribution required to deliver their projects. Projects were scored based on the delivery of a project in full,
- 3.4 Officers scored the grant bids based on the agreed criteria, and a copy of the completed scoring matrix was provided to Members.(Appendix B)
- 3.5 After considered deliberation, Members recommend that Annual Community Grants should be awarded as follows:

- 3.6 The Grants Board noted that the strength and breadth of applications resulted in difficult decisions being made, and unsuccessful applicants will be signposted to the One Welwyn Hatfield community lottery and other grant programmes to continue their fundraising.

Implications

4 Legal Implication(s)

- 4.1 A Service Level Agreement is entered into between the council and each successful grant applicant.
- 4.2 The discretionary award of grants must follow a clear evaluation criterion, this has been used to determine the successful applicants.
- 4.3 Risks of non-delivery have been considered through the evaluation (for example if we are aware the deliverability of a scheme is reliant on third party approval,

which has not already been obtained) as the Council must be reasonably confident that schemes can be delivered.

5 Financial Implication(s)

- 4.4 The Annual Grants budget included in the 2025/26 budget s £73,000. Grants Board have not exceeded this potential allocation in considering the applications put forward.
- 4.5 The applications received total £361,979.50 which was more than the available budget of £73,000. Members of the Grant Board considered the scoring of applications as set out in the evaluation matrix and agreed funding on the basis of the agreed scheme criteria.

5 <u>Risk Management Implications</u>

- 5.1 There is a risk related to providing grants to voluntary organisations in that there is the possibility that the organisation could go into administration and as such the funding would be lost. There is also the possibility that organisations do not spend the grant provided on the agreed projects or costs as per their applications.
- 5.2 The risks are mitigated as much as possible through the application process, where information has been provided about the organisation, its governance and financial structures and the reason it has applied for funding. All successful grant applicants sign up a service level agreement with the council which sets out the terms of the grant and also what information is to be provided to monitor the outcomes. The information provided includes evidence on where the funding was spent.

Risk Score Likelihood Low; Impact Medium. Overall risk score Low.

6.1 In complying with the Prevent duty Local Authorities need to ensure that publicly owned resources do not provide a platform for extremists and are not used to disseminate extremist views.
