What are the aims/ objectives/purpose or outcome or intended effects of the policy, project or service?	A formal consultation with service users and residents was carried out in summer 2022. The consultation was to seek views on the following two proposals:  a) The proposal to move from direct delivery by the council and instead partner with Hertfordshire County Council (HCC) to enable delivery of the lunch club community bus service to Jimmy Macs at The Hive.  b) Ceasing direct delivery of the Shopper Hopper service, instead promoting the use of the Community Transport Herts signposting service.  A pre-consultation EQIA was completed.  After consideration of the consultation feedback, the recommendations have changed. The proposal is to move from direct delivery by the council and instead work in partnership with Communities First Charity to enable delivery of the two services combined: transport for Jimmy Macs lunch club and a shopping bus service		



All users of both services must be either aged 60 years or older or have a disability. No personal data about an individual's characteristic groups is collected. Apart from the initial enquiry to register for the service where checks about age and disability are collected, these are then not stored. The service under GDPR has no reason for collecting and storing such data. As service users request the bus service to collect them, What equality data is mobility requirements are captured s part of the journey available relating to the request. Any wheelchairs take up two seats so capacity use or implementation of needs to be monitored based on mobility requirements. the policy, project or service? Any additional mobility/assistance requirements needing the tail-lift to be used is also captured per a trip due to the overall timings and length of the trips. From this we do know that some of the service users do have disabilities and mobility difficulties requiring assistance. Some are also very frail and vulnerable.
